# **FAITH JOURNEY**

My name is Baffour Nkrumah-Appiah also known as Robert. I was born on July 1, 1957 in Ghana, on the continent of Africa. Being the last of twenty-five children to one father married to four wives at one time was not the place or time to seek attention as a child. The culture dictated that a man could marry as many wives as he could care for, and that is exactly what my father did. At an early age I began to seek attention and fulfillment from friends and other children who were from a similar background as me.

This unofficial club of "needy" children (of which I was a member) became recipients of attention from strange white people dressed in African attire who spoke only English, and spoke it so fast that none of us could understand them. Through befriending the children of these missionaries, we were invited to attend our first Baptist church service, conducted by these white people.

The first message I heard in a Sunday evening, Southern Baptist Missionary service in Accra Ghana was "You did not choose me, but I chose you to go and bear fruit that will last (John 15:16)." I marveled at the thought that this huge and mighty God I had heard so much about in the stories of the Israelites in Egypt and at the parting of the Red Sea could be personally interested in me. That was the beginning of this wonderful, exciting, and

sometimes challenging journey. I knew without any ambiguity or reservation that I had been chosen to be part of this great gift of salvation, regardless of the color of my skin or the region of the world. With that, I became a follower of the Lord Jesus Christ and His saving grace at the age of 17 in 1974 through the mission work of these Southern Baptist Missionaries, who were planting churches in Ghana, West Africa. After 4 years of friendship, I was invited by one of the missionary families to visit them in the United States, my acceptance of their invitation and arrival in May 1978, marked the beginning of a new chapter in my life.

#### CHRISTIAN EXPERIENCE

Upon arrival in the United States in 1978, I spent several years working minimum paying jobs to support myself, including driving NYC taxi service. I began my undergraduate work at Fordham University in New York City in 1989, and received my Bachelors of Science in Economics and Finance degree in 1994. During my college years, I joined Calvary Baptist Church in New York City, and was involved in numerous Christian organizations, both on- and off-campus evangelizing and witnessing to the youth in the dangerous areas of the city during 5 years.

After meeting my wife Christiana, I moved to Boston in July 1994, and began working for an international banking organization. We have two boys, Alexander (age 18) and William (age 17).

The Lord continued to use me in Boston. 1998, I began graduate work on my Masters of Science in management and leadership at Emmanuel College in Boston, Massachusetts.

During same period 1998 December, I was elected director of the junior church program, and a deacon at Twelfth Baptist Church of Boston under the leadership and supervision of Rev. Dr. Michael E. Haynes for 7 years until 2005, however I continued to minister in other capacities.

After 19 years in banking, and 10 years as an Assistant-vice president, In July 2013, I finally gave in to God's calling that happened in 1974 in Ghana, Africa.

I am now two-thirds of the way through my Master of Divinity degree program at Gordon Conwell Theological Seminary. At the seminary, I serve as a Pierce Fellow through the John and Lois Pierce Center for Discipleship Building. A spiritual formation compliment to the excellent academic and ministry skill development each student receives at the Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary, an experience that has helped me to grow in my understanding of Christ-centered discipleship. It is also helping me to develop a passion for the church's role in spiritual formation and discipleship building as a missionary pastor. I want to give back what the Lord gave to me through the missionary's years ago.

#### CALL TO MINISTRY

I am currently serving as the executive pastor with Rev. Dr. Roger Haber, my mentor, at First Baptist Church in Randolph. With my current position at First Baptist, I have the honor of being responsible for supervising the staff, Sunday school, and most of the ministries, including facilities. It has also been a privilege to preach on some Sundays. My prayer is that, there will be an opportunity to send the Word out to those who need it, especially in Africa. I pray one day I can be useful there for His service.

#### **BAPTIST DISTINCTIONS AND HISTORY**

Several theological principles make the Baptist church a distinct body among Christians. We believe that the Bible is the supreme authority for the Church. Every believer has direct access to God through Christ, and most importantly the individual responsibility to God for the performance of duty...bringing him face-to-face with God. The autonomy of the local Church is distinctive to Baptists, the Church is a visible body of Scripturally baptized believers, equal in ranks and privileges, administering its own affairs under the leadership of Jesus Christ.

As part of the Free Church movement, they sought to restore the purity of the Church from its secular influences. I became a member of the American Baptist Churches, (ABC) because of these Free Church principles. I have been active in the local Old Colony Baptist Association, where I have been elected as the vice moderator

#### **STATEMENT OF BELIEFS**

# **TRINITY**

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The doctrine of the Trinity has been accepted as the cornerstone of the church's teaching from its early history. The awesomeness of the Triune God is reflected in this statement: There is only one God: this God exists eternally in three distinct persons, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. They are completely equal, each fully possessing the divine nature.

#### GOD

I believe in one God revealed as eternally existing in three equal and distinct persons; the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit (2 Cor. 13:14 – "The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.") I believe each of the three, Father, Son, and the Holy Spirit are/is to be worshiped as the Triune God. I believe the love and unity within the Trinity is a model for the church. God is the Creator of all things, transcendent, and love (John 1:3 - "All things were made through him, and without him was not any thing made that was made. Hebrews 11:3 – "By faith we understand that the universe was created by the word of God, so that what is seen was not made out of things that are visible", Col. 1:16 - "For by him all things were created, in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities – all things were created through him and for him"). I believe the attributes of God speak to the very characteristics of His nature, while the very essence of God is revealed to us as omniscient,

omnipotent, omnipresent, eternal, spirit, personal, and unchanging. That which God has revealed of Himself is beyond total human comprehension.

#### **JESUS**

I believe that Jesus Christ is the second person of the Trinity; conceived by the miraculous work of the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, fully God and fully human. I believe that He died for the sins of humanity as a representative and substitutionary sacrifice and that His death was sufficient reparation for the guilt of humanity. I believe in the resurrection of the crucified body of our Lord, in His ascension into Heaven at the right hand of God, and in His present life there for us as High Priest and Advocate.

I believe in the deity of the Lord Jesus Christ. Jesus Christ is fully divine (John 4:15 – "The woman said to him, "Sir, give me this water, so that I will not be thirsty or have to come here to draw water") and fully human (John 4:2 – "although Jesus himself did not baptize, but only his disciples"). He is the Redeemer", Matthew 26:28 – "For this is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins", Romans 3:25 – "Whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith. This was to show God's righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over former sins"). Jesus' preexistence is evident in the Old Testament and the New Testament, as stated in John 1:1-3: "In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God, and the Word is God". This tells me that He is truly God and has always co-existed with the Father and with the Holy Spirit

#### **HOLY SPIRIT**

I believe the Holy Spirit is the third person of the Trinity (2 Cor. 13:14 – The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all"). The Holy Spirit is coequal (Jn. 14:26 – "But the Helper, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, he will teach you all things and bring to your remembrance all that I have said to you") and coeternal (Heb. 9:14 – "How much more will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without blemish to God, purify our conscience from dead works to serve the living God") with the Father and the Son. The Holy Spirit is intelligent, comprehending the thoughts of human and God (1 Cor. 2:11 – "For who knows a person's thoughts except the spirit of that person, which is in him? So also no one comprehends the thoughts of God except the Spirit of God").

The Holy Spirit comforts, (Eph. 1:12-14 – "So that we who were the first to hope in Christ might be to the praise of His glory. In Him you also, when you heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and believed in Him, were sealed with the promised Holy Spirit, who is the guarantee of our inheritance until we acquire possession of it, to the praise of his glory") prays, and intercedes on our behalf (Romans 8:26-27 – "Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness. For we do not know what to pray for as we ought, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groaning too deep for words. And he who searches hearts knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God"). The Holy Spirit testifies about Christ, (Jn. 14:26 – But the Helper,

the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, he will teach you all things and bring to your remembrance all that I have said to you"). I believe in the Holy Spirit as a divine person, a personality distinct from the Father and the Son.

#### **CREATION**

God created the world (Proverbs 3:19 – "The Lord by wisdom founded the earth; by understanding he established the heavens"), "by wisdom the Lord laid the earth's foundations, by understanding He sat the heavens in place". (Isaiah 44:24) "This is what the Lord says, your Redeemer, who formed you in the womb: I am the Lord, who has made all things, who alone stretched out the heavens, who spread out the earth by myself". (Genesis 1:1) In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. (John 1:3) "Through him (Christ) all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made". (Colossians 1:16) "For by him (Christ) all things were made: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities, all things were created by him and for him". The above scriptures all point to the one and only God who created the universe, Jesus the Christ.

#### **HUMANITY**

Part of this wonderful creation was humanity, (Genesis 1:26) "Then God said, Let us make man in our image, according to our likeness: let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, over all the earth and over every creeping thing that creeps on the earth". When it came to the creation of man God said, "Let us create man in our

image, according to our likeness". Indeed I am His creation and He is my maker and therefore there is a natural willingness to draw near unto Him.

St Augustine writes in the Institute (book 48) "Your works praise you that we may love you, and we love you that your works may praise you. They have a beginning and an end in time, a rise and a fall, a start and a finish".

#### THE FALL

The question of God's relationship with evil has always been a contentious one. It has been stated in the Book of Genesis, when the fall happened, and why it happened. My understanding of this theological mystery is supported by the Old Testament Scripture (Genesis 2:16-17), "The Lord God commanded the man, You are free to eat from any tree of the garden; but you must not eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, for when you eat of it you will surely die" We later found out that was not an empty threat by God to the human. As it became known, human disobeyed God, and the result is a world of chaos. Sin required a savior. (Psalm 51:5) "Surely I have been a sinner from birth, sinful from the time my mother conceived me". (Proverb 20:9) Who can say, "I have kept my heart pure; I am clean and without sin"?

#### **SALVATION**

The Bible teaches us (1 Corinthians 15:22) "For as in Adam all die, so in Christ all will be made alive". None of us can boast in ourselves. It is through the righteousness and justification of Christ that we can be worthy to be called

Children of God. Jesus Christ died for the sins of humanity as a representative and sacrifice that His death was sufficient reparation for the guilt of all humankind. In the resurrection of the crucified, He ascended into Heaven, and sat at the right hand of God the Father, advocating on our behalf as the High Priest.

#### **SANTIFICATION**

Scripture defines sanctification as the gracious operation of the Holy Spirit. (1 Cor. 1:30) It involves our responsible participation, which delivers us as justified sinners, renews our entire nature according to the image of God, and enables us to live pleasingly to Him.

### **JUSTIFICATION**

Justification is described as "For our sake he made him to be sin that knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God" (2 Cor. 5:21). This is a declarative act of God (acts of sin being removed on the basis of Christ's work of reconciliation). This clarification is important to the core of salvation. Both sanctification and justification are acts initiated by the mercy of God.

**SCRIPTURE** 

I believe in the divine inspiration and authority of the Scriptures, (2 Timothy 3:16-17 – "All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for

reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work"). The Scriptures were written through the inspiration and guidance of the Holy Spirit (2 Peter 1:21 – "For no prophecy was ever produced by the will of man, but men spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit"). It is also my conviction that God has exercised care and providence through the ages in preserving the written Word, (Hebrew 4:12 – "For the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing to the division of soul and of spirit, of joints and of marrow, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart"). The result is the very Word of God, the only authority for faith and practice (necessary for salvation and proper relationship to God).

# THE CHURCH

The Church is the body of believers brought together to spread the Good News and to support one another through the help of the Holy Spirit. Within their local churches, individual Christians each carry the responsibility of supporting one another through the work of mission, ensuring that the Word is spread to an unsaved world.

#### **THE ORDINANCES**

The Baptist Church has two ordinances given to her by the Lord, Believer's baptism (Matt. 28:19 – "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit"; Acts 2:41-

42 – "So those who received his word were baptized, and there were added that day about three thousand souls. Believer's baptism is to be administered by immersion (Acts 8: 38-39 – "And he commanded the chariot to stop, and they both went down into the water, Philip and the eunuch, and he baptized them"). It is an outward experience of what has already taken place when the sinner was saved. It is identifying with Jesus in His death, burial, and resurrection to new life in Christ (Rom. 6:3-4 – "Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into his death? We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in the newness of life").

Christ instituted the Lord's Supper as told in (Matt. 26:26 – "Now as they were eating, Jesus took bread, and after blessing it broke it and gave it to the disciples, and said, 'Take, eat; this is my body'"). This is the time when believers remember that His body was broken for us. As often as we eat the bread and drink of the cup, we are proclaiming the Lord's death as we remember Him, until He comes (1Cor. 11:23-26 – "For I received from the Lord what I also delivered to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it, and said 'This is my body which is for you. Do this in remembrance of me.' In the same way also he took the cup, after supper, saying, 'this cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.' For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes").

#### **CODE OF ETHICS**

Having accepted God's call to leadership in Christ's Church, I covenant with God to serve Christ and the Church, and with the help of the Holy Spirit, to deepen my obedience to the Two Great Commandments: to love the Lord our God with all my heart, soul, mind and strength, and to love my neighbor as myself.

In affirmation of this commitment, I will abide by the Code of Ethics of the Ministers Council of the American Baptist Churches and I will faithfully support its purposes and ideals. As further affirmation of my commitment, I covenant with my colleagues in ministry that we will hold one another accountable for fulfillment of all the public actions set forth in our Code of Ethics.

I will hold in trust the traditions and practices of our American Baptist Churches; I will not accept a position in the American Baptist family unless I am in accord with those traditions and practices; nor will I use my influence to alienate my congregation/constituents or any part thereof from its relationship and support of the denomination. If my convictions change, I will resign my position.

I will respect and recognize the variety of calls to ministry among my American Baptist colleagues, and other Christians. I will seek to support all colleagues in ministry by building constructive relationships wherever I serve, both with the staff where I work and with colleagues in neighboring churches.

I will advocate adequate compensation for my profession. I will help laypersons and colleagues to understand that ministerial leaders should not expect or require fees for pastoral services from constituents they serve, when these constituents are helping pay their salaries. I will not seek personal favors or discounts on the basis of my ministerial status. I will maintain a disciplined ministry in such ways as keeping hours of prayers and devotion, endeavoring to maintain wholesome family relationships, sexual integrity, financial responsibility, regularly engaging in educational and recreational activities for ministerial and personal development.

I will seek to maintain good health habits. I will recognize my primary obligation to the church or employing group to which I have been called, and will accept added responsibilities only if they do not interfere with the overall effectiveness of my ministry. I will personally and publicly support my colleagues who experience discrimination on the basis of gender, race, ethnicity, age, marital status, national origin, physical impairment or disability.

I will not proselytize from other Christian churches. I will, upon my resignation or retirement, sever my ministerial leadership relations with my former constituents, and will not make ministerial contacts in the field of another ministerial leader without his/her request and/or consent. I will hold in

confidence and treat as confidential communication any information provided to me with the expectation of privacy.

I will not disclose such information in private or public except when, in my practice of ministry, I am convinced that the sanctity of confidentiality is outweighed by my well-founded belief that life-threatening or substantial harm will be caused. I will not use my ministerial status, position or authority knowingly to abuse, misguide, negatively influence, manipulate, or take advantage of anyone, especially children.

I will report all instances of abuse as required by law to the appropriate agency. In any case involving persons working in ABC ministry, I will also report the circumstances to the appropriate regional and/or national denominational representative. I will show my personal love for God as revealed in Jesus Christ in my life and ministry, as I strive together with my colleagues to preserve the dignity, maintain the discipline and promote the integrity of the vocation to which we have been called.

#### **SUMMARY**

In summary, my belief is shaped by cultural and ethnic upbringing. At some point of faith maturity, the grace of God through the Holy Spirit witnesses through a spoken word that leads us into eternal salvation. This begins the maneuverings of various Christian doctrines depending on what I was taught in my early years. These opinions and principles shape my walk with the Lord.

Studying scripture helps me to decide which doctrine is consistent with the Bible.

I ask the Holy Spirit to help me hear the voice of God by reading His Word, through constant prayer, and with the gift of discernment.

My sincere prayer is to continue to dwell in His presence all the days of my life, even as I seek to do His pastoral call on me as part of the body of His Church. Amen.
