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## Faith Journey, Christian Experience & Call to Ministry

# Faith Journey

My name is Victoria Frances Pina. I am 47 years old. I was born and raised in Brockton, MA. My home church is Messiah Baptist Church in Brockton of which I am a lifelong member. I am divorced, and I have two beautiful daughters, Arianna, age 25 and Gabrielle, age 15. I have found nothing more rewarding than raising two intelligent, caring, and capable human beings. My daughter, Arianna, is currently pursuing a master's degree at Johns Hopkins University and Gabrielle is an honors student at New Heights Charter School in Brockton. My children represent the 4th generation of our Pina family to attend Messiah Baptist Church. It is an honor to continue this family legacy of worship and church affiliation. My present call to ministry has led me to serve as pastor of First Baptist Church in Hanson. I was installed as pastor on September 4, 2022, and I am blessed to currently serve the church in Hanson in this pastoral role.

My faith journey began when I was about 5 years old. I was in kindergarten when I first realized God existed. I asked my parents many questions about God. My parents were both Christians who shared their belief in God with me. I count it a blessing to be raised in a family of faith. I attended a Catholic School because my parents believed I would receive a better education. I was taught prayers: the Our Father, the Hail Mary, and the Apostles Creed. My teacher, a nun named Sister Theresa, would read stories from the Bible and talk about Jesus Christ. Sister Theresa not only had stories, but also songs and music to accompany her stories. I vividly remember the lyrics to one of these: "You gave me a heart, and you gave me a smile, you gave us Jesus, and you made me your child, but I just thank you God for making me, me, Uh huh huh, Oh!"

Sister Theresa instructed all her students to attend church on Sundays with their families, emphasizing the importance of having a healthy relationship with God.

Consequently, I went to my parents frequently to discuss my church attendance. My mother grew annoyed and advised me that we would attend church when she could find the time. My mother made the house rules, and we were required to follow them.

My father was a police officer who worked Sundays, holidays, and often seven days a week. My mother's field was education and she taught five days a week. She fiercely believed in education. She was a bookworm; she was always overly studious. She eventually earned a master's degree in education, graduating with distinction. Sister Theresa was visibly dissatisfied by my irregular church attendance. She prayed over me, making the sign of the cross on my forehead. She placed pink plastic rosary beads around my neck to use for praying at home. I thanked her for the gift and returned to my seat feeling sad and rejected.

When I was in the 2nd grade, I was upset that my classmates were making their First Communion. I could participate in Mass by singing and reading scriptures, but I was not allowed to partake in Holy Communion. This really bothered me, so I discussed it with my mother. I explained to her that communion was important and all my classmates received it. I was left in the church pew feeling alienated and embarrassed during communion.

I complained about my situation, but my mother kept telling me our religion was different. I had been blessed as an infant but not yet baptized. I grew frustrated and impatient with her. I wanted to fit in at Mass and at school. I felt like an interloper. I was the little black girl at a predominantly white school. I was often misconstrued as having no religion and apparently no faith. My classmates questioned my belief in God. This troubled me to my core. When Father Kelleher spoke to my mother about my situation, she thanked the priest for his good intentions. She refused conversion and said we were proud Baptists, and she was unwilling to convert to Catholicism. There was no further discussion necessary. She was not easily influenced or coaxed into anything contrary to her own beliefs.

After my failed attempts to get my mother to understand my plight, I took matters into my own hands. I read the Bible at home. I dressed in one of her old graduation robes pretending it was a minister's robe. I took a slice of white bread and removed the cap from a Coca Cola bottle. I made perfect circles by pressing the bottle cap into the bread.

I took a butter knife to extract the circles from the bread. I got juice and poured it into Dixie mouthwash cups. I sat everything together neatly on a little serving tray. I called my older sister, Rena, and younger brother, Louis, into the family room to have church with me. We read scriptures together, sang songs and shared communion. This was our service on many Sundays. It was enough to placate me for a while. I wanted to be closer to God, learn more about my religion, and attend church every Sunday.

#### **Christian Experience**

My mother's best friend, Auntie Sheryl, attended church frequently at Messiah Baptist Church in Brockton. My Grandma Louise and Auntie Marty sang there in the church choir in the 1950's. Mom and Dad were married there on July 15, 1971. I was blessed as a baby in 1976 at Messiah. Auntie Sheryl brought me to Messiah one Sunday morning in the Spring of 1983. The church was crowded but we managed to find seats. I could see the choir, the pastor, and the big cross on the ceiling from my vantage point. When the choir sang, I began feeling happy inside. A lady named Ms. Molden sang powerfully enough to seemingly make the angels come down from Heaven. The choir sang in harmony with her, and I was amazed by their vocal talent.

When Rev. Walker preached, I listened intently. After the sermon, all the lights went off in the sanctuary and the cross on the ceiling lit up. I was mesmerized by it. "Auntie, it lights up," I whispered, completely astonished. She smiled at me reassuringly and gently rubbed my back. They didn't have a golden cross that lit up where I attended Mass at school. A revelation came to me that Sunday. I did have a religion and a church home. I was not an interloper. I remember feeling at peace knowing God was with me. I felt a sense of belonging and satisfaction. I was not sitting alone feeling deserted in the church pew. I knew at that moment there was a sweet, sweet, spirit in this place.

I accompanied Auntie Sheryl to church many more times. I was persistent and kept pestering my parents. Finally, they conceded that we should attend church as a family. We attended church weekly and became involved in church life. I attended Sunday

School with my siblings. I was 9 years old when I met Deacon Ramona Jackson. She was my first Sunday School teacher. I was very timid, and I did not like public speaking. She asked me to read scripture in class and I declined. I declined politely, but that did not matter. I didn't read at school because I never volunteered. My teacher only picked on volunteers. Deacon Jackson obviously had a different selection process. She changed from a sweet old lady into someone who put the fear of God in me. My heart started racing. She told me that I was to read, and I only had one choice. I read without further incident. "What's the problem?" she inquired. I explained to her that public speaking made me feel nervous and anxious. She made me read scripture in class every single Sunday thereafter. Deacon Jackson taught me to speak boldly with confidence.

Rena and I joined the youth choir. I went to Vacation Bible School in the summers which was taught by my cousin, Rev. Dayann Johnson. When I was 13 years old, she allowed me to be a teen helper with Sunday School and Children's Church. She recognized my calling before I ever understood this terminology. She talked with me about all things spiritual. She prayed for me and blessed me. Min. Kathleen Durham taught me my first memorization scripture. It was Proverbs 3:5-6. "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge God and God shall direct your path." This scripture has carried me through dark times in life when I felt discouraged, hurt, uncertain, or fearful. I would recite this scripture to myself, and it brought me comfort. Min. Durham taught me to remember and carry the word of God in my heart.

When I was 16 years old, I chose to surrender my life to Jesus Christ. I was baptized at Watch Night service on New Year's Eve on December 31, 1991. I was baptized by Pastor Walker at Messiah. If ever there was a person who brought Christ in the room, it is my friend, Pastor Walker. He is a loving, kind, and gentle soul. He has such a powerful witness that I feel a nearness to God by being around him. Pastor Walker always has a smile on his face, and he always has something positive or affirming to

say to people. Pastor Walker is a man of wisdom and grace. He taught me many valuable lessons about life and God through his sermons over the years.

I attended Cardinal Spellman High School where I received many awards. As a sophomore, I was inducted into the National Honor Society. As a junior, I tutored students, and I was voted Senior Class Vice-President. All these honors and distinctions were meaningful. However, Sister Thomasine, the school principal said that since the existence of Cardinal Spellman High School a non-Catholic student had never received the Religious Academic Excellence award. Although I was Baptist, she stated I excelled in all four years of my religious studies receiving "A" grades. She said it was an honor to bestow the award upon me because I demonstrated the love and acceptance of Christ.

On Baccalaureate night, there was thunderous applause from the entire audience along with a standing ovation. I glanced at my parents, and I could see the look of pride on their faces as I walked on stage to accept my award. A loving nature and attitude to serve others was something cultivated in me by both of my parents. They helped to shape, mold, and nurture me by their love, concern, and guidance. When I was growing up over the years, my parents made many sacrifices for me. They were kind and generous people who taught me by example. Louis and Frances Pina will always be a blessing in my life. I praise God for them. My father is deceased, and I miss him immensely. My mother currently suffers from Alzheimer's disease, and it is painful to watch her decline. Our faith as Christians has helped our family to navigate this terrible disease. I am privileged and proud to call myself their daughter.

#### Call to Ministry

After graduating from Cardinal Spellman in May of 1994, I matriculated to Tufts University pursuing a Bachelor of Arts in English. During my studies at Tufts, I took Old Testament and New Testament courses. The professor was a visiting lecturer from Boston University School of Theology. He expanded and challenged my mind. I prayed daily; I read the Bible daily. I always had ideas and questions when attending class.

It was during this time as a 19-year-old college student that I knew with certainty God had a plan and a purpose for my life. I expressed an interest in pastoral ministry to my father. He was surprised but encouraged me to follow my heart.

I have matured and grown spiritually over the years, and I feel God has equipped me for all I have been called to accomplish. The Holy Spirit convicted me of this during my 3 years of study at TABCOM School of Ministry. My period of testing and discernment. I gained foundational knowledge and experience at TABCOM School of Ministry. I am currently enrolled at Gordon Conwell Theological Seminary working toward a Master of Divinity. I want to preach the gospel and spread the good news. I wish to be ordained because I want to be consecrated and set apart to complete this work. I feel called to pastoral ministry and I am truly blessed to carry out this call in the performance of my duties as pastor of First Baptist Church in Hanson.

#### God

God is the Creator of all that exists. God reigns in Heaven and earth. God is the alpha and the omega. God was, God is, and God is to come. God is a divine being, a spirit without the limitations of space, time, or location. God is faithful, merciful, and forgiving. God loves us unconditionally. God is righteous and just. God is truth. Those who love God put their hope, trust, and faith in seeking to understand truth. Truth is that which is consistent with the mind, will, character, glory, and being of God. Truth is the self-expression of God. Truth is theological; the definition of truth flows from God. Truth is fundamentally spiritual. God never deviates from truth.

Although the word trinity is not found in the Bible, it is accepted by many Christians as a way of explaining and understanding the triune God. There is God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit, three facets of one God. All three persons are separate, but all three persons are equal. All three persons work together. The will of the Father is the will of the Son and the will of the Holy Spirit. We relate to the trinity, but there is only one God. Our God is holy. God renders a holy response to the unholy, a just reaction to

the unjust. God detests sin and corruption. God is to be treated with total reverenceworshipped and glorified by all creation.

#### **Jesus Christ**

Jesus is the second being of the trinity. Jesus is God incarnate. "The word became flesh and dwelt among us full of grace and truth" (John 1:14). Jesus was sent into the world to redeem the sins of humanity. Our sinfulness damaged our relationship with God, but Jesus repaired our relationship with God. Jesus lived a life both human and divine. He was pure and holy without sin or blemish. We are no longer slaves to sin because Jesus paid our debt on Calvary. Jesus made the ultimate sacrifice by willingly laying down His life. We were ransomed by His blood. Jesus was raised from the dead three days after suffering from death by crucifixion. Our faith in Jesus secures our salvation. We must acknowledge Jesus as our Lord and Savior. Those who believe in Him shall not perish but be given eternal life. Jesus intercedes for us to make us righteous before God. Yeshua is His name in Hebrew, and it means, "the Lord saves." Jesus is also referred to as Emmanuel which means, "God with us."

#### **Holy Spirit**

The Holy Spirit is a divine being and the third being of the trinity. The Holy Spirit is "the Helper" whom Jesus sent into the world when returning to the Father. Jesus did not leave us to live in the world without help or hope. The Holy Spirit is a divine intercessor who acts on our behalf. The Holy Spirit takes on distinct roles in our lives. As "the Comforter", the Holy Spirit provides support in our times of uncertainty and sorrow. The Holy Spirit also convicts us of our sinful nature and guides us to repentance. The Holy Spirit offers revelation, wisdom, and guides us to truth.

The Holy Spirit is an indwelling and powerful presence at work in every Christian believer. We each benefit from the fruits of the spirit which are gifts intended to build up the church and strengthen our connection to God.

## Humanity

Humanity is a special creation made in God's own image and likeness. We are the crowning glory of God's creation. We each carry God's breath of life inside of us which is how we are made in God's image. There is sanctity of all human life because all humanity has intrinsic value and worth. Our mind, body, and soul are created to glorify God. Humanity is viewed equally in the eyes of God. There is no superior gender or race. These sinful man-made distinctions are used to justify exploitation and oppression. God has no partiality. God loves all of us equally and unconditionally. We were not created to be creatures of solitude. Human beings need interaction with one another to give mutual support and encouragement. We are expected to live a life that is holy and pleasing to God.

#### Salvation

We receive salvation by God's grace. There was nothing that humanity could do to save ourselves from sin, so God devised a plan. If we accept Jesus Christ as our Lord and Savior, then we are saved by faith through God's grace. "If you declare with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and know in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you shall be saved" (Rom. 10:9). God freely offers salvation to us despite our unworthiness. God has given us all free will, so it is our choice to accept Jesus or to reject Him. The Christian gospel of salvation is a gift from God for all humanity. There is no other source of salvation besides Jesus Christ and only the gift of salvation bears an eternal value.

#### Scripture

"All scripture is God breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting, and training in righteousness, so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work" (2 Timothy 3:16-17). The Bible is the divinely inspired word of God to be studied by all Christians. It offers insight and knowledge detailing how to live a life

that is righteous and pleasing to God. It contains information that is reliable and useful for guidance and putting our faith into practice.

The Bible continuously points to Jesus Christ as the means of salvation. The Bible is holy, and its scriptures possess meaning and authority. The word of God endures because it is trustworthy and dependable. It is always relatable and applicable to every human situation or life circumstance. As Christians, we are taught not to be conformed to the pattern of this world, but to be transformed by the renewing of our minds through scripture. The Bible provides believers with timeless wisdom and valuable instruction.

#### Church

The church is the body of believers who put their faith in Jesus Christ. The church has responsibilities which include: preaching the gospel, administering ordinances, offering fellowship, and supporting members of the congregation and the community at large. The church strives to be welcoming and accepting toward all people by demonstrating the love of Christ. It is important to create Christian communities that promote unity and offer numerous opportunities for fellowship. The church provides a peaceful refuge to escape the conflict and chaos of this world. The church is called to assist people with spiritual, physical, and emotional needs. The needs of people must be identified in order to minister effectively. The church responds by offering swift and restorative assistance. These efforts support and transition people from brokenness to wholeness. There is restoration, healing, and wholeness in Christ. The role of the church is to serve and to connect people to Christ.

## The Ordinances of Baptism & The Lord's Supper

Baptists observe two ordinances which are Baptism and the Lord's Supper. Baptism is a public expression of faith. The Believer's Baptism is typically performed when an individual is old enough to fully understand the complexity of surrendering one's life to Christ. This is an event where traditionally one is immersed in water to symbolize the

change the Holy Spirit has made in an individual's heart. All who follow Christ are called 325 to be baptized. As commanded by our Lord, "Go and make disciples out of all nations 326 327 baptizing them in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit" (Matthew 28:19). The water of baptism symbolically washes away our sins and cleanses us from 328 unrighteousness. We die to our former selves and become new creations in Christ. 329 330 The Lord's Supper is an ordinance that we engage in as a way of remembrance. 331 Communion is a time to examine ourselves and reflect on our lives and walk with God. 332 We serve a God of mercy and forgiveness. We come together in common union to 333 remember Christ's unfailing love and forgiveness. We remember the sacrifice Jesus 334 made on the cross at Calvary. The Lord's Supper emphasizes the love of Christ. This 335 ordinance affords us the opportunity to offer gratitude and praise for this extraordinary 336 sacrifice. 337 338 ABC USA, Ecumenical Witness, Code of Ethics & Ministerial Concerns 339 340 **ABC USA** 341 342 I believe in the values of the American Baptist Churches, USA. The Baptist identity is 343 344 structured around four freedoms: Biblical, Soul, Church, and Religious. I believe that in keeping with Baptist principles, local church congregations should remain independent 345 and autonomous. No archdiocese interprets scripture for the local church or dictates its 346 practice in the Baptist Church denomination. 347 348 349 I also believe it benefits churches to affiliate with our regional branch which is The American Baptist Churches of Massachusetts and the local branch of Old Colony 350 Baptist Association. These branches exist to offer support and resources to churches, 351 but they do not dictate practice, policy, or procedure. When we collaborate with our 352 regional or local branch associations, we can accomplish larger goals and missions. 353 We can reach and minister to a greater number of people through fellowship, training, 354

and unified missions.

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#### **Ecumenical Witness & Interfaith Witness**

It is valuable for the local church to join with other Christ-centered congregations for the purposes of unity, fellowship, and cooperative mission. It is beneficial to work together in a spirit of unity. The universal nature of the Body of Christ inspires us to collaborate through worship, shared resources, and missions. As a church leader, I have the responsibility to build connections and foster ecumenical relationships. We must work far beyond the four walls of our home church to impact others. I also support collaborative interfaith efforts as it is necessary to cultivate good relationships in the community.

#### Code of Ethics

I am a member in good standing at Messiah Baptist Church and First Baptist Church of Hanson. A code of ministerial ethics is important for providing accountability among ministers and necessary to promote guidelines for acceptable conduct. I have read, understood, and agree to uphold the Code of Ethics of the American Baptist Churches, USA. I have supplied a signed copy of the ABC Ministers Council Covenant and Code of Ethics to the commission chairperson.

## **Ministerial Concerns & Compassion**

As a minister of the gospel, I have a passion for social justice. Our God is a just God. I feel it is my duty and obligation to speak out against institutions, systems, laws, practices, and programs that are unjust. My concern is that all people should be treated equitably with human decency and respect. I am drawn to help women and single parents, especially because I personally understand their struggles and frustrations. I have compassion for them and an awareness of the unique challenges they face.

I am also sympathetic to the issues of immigrants. If we are not creating dialogue or seeking solutions to address problems, then we ourselves are contributing to the problem. We must create change which begins with dialogue. We need to have those discussions that are difficult and uncomfortable. My job as a minister of the gospel is to help the lost, the lonely and the left out. I must provide encouragement and hope to those who have been stepped over and stepped on by our society.

The church has a duty to advocate for marginalized people- the women and children, the elderly, the poor, and the immigrants. We must speak up as a voice for the voiceless and protect those who are the most vulnerable in our communities. It is not an easy task, but change has never come easily. It takes hard work, commitment, sacrifice, and determination. We need to have a willingness to be about God's business.
